The Office of Regional Superintendent



The Regional Superintendent of Schools is the chief administrative educational officer of an educational service region, and the only elected education professional office in Illinois. The Office of the Regional Superintendent performs regulatory functions as directed by the Illinois School Code.

The Code states that, "The Regional Superintendent of Schools:

- shall exercise supervision and control over all school districts in the county.
- shall act as the official advisor and assistant of the school officers and teachers in his region. In the performance of this duty he shall carry out the advice of the State Superintendent of Education."

In addition to coordinating and delivering state and local services, the Regional Superintendent acts as an advocate for education by providing positive leadership and disseminating information for educators, school districts and the community.

The six main areas of responsibility include educational administration, cooperation management, financial, health and life safety, public relations, and transportation. For a detailed list of responsibilities, please visit <https://www.roe26.net/about>

Special duties of the Regional Superintendent are stated in the School Code and can be summarized in two major areas: Service and Assurances to the Public.

Service components are generally grouped as: legislative, legal, cooperative management, research dissemination, educational administration and citizen representation. Each component requires specific skills placing the Regional Superintendent in an alliance role. As the alliance agent, the Regional Superintendent brings together people, concepts and resources to provide educational services.

Assurances to the public include: fiscal responsibilities, local performance, life safety, certification, supervision and curriculum. In these areas, legislation places enforcement responsibilities on the Regional Superintendent to guarantee that certain minimums are met and legal parameters followed. In most instances, enforcement responsibilities becomes services to help schools and school personnel meet minimum expectation.

During the school year, the Regional Superintendent and staff receive hundreds of telephone calls, letters and visits from parents, school personnel, and citizens concerning a multitude of educational concerns. It is the policy of the Regional Superintendent to give prompt service and accurate information to any individual or group seeking assistance. The Regional Superintendent also acts as an advocate for education by providing positive leadership and disseminating information for educators, school districts and the community.

Legal Reference for Annual Report

This annual report is designed in part to meet the provisions of Chapter 105, Article 3, Sections 5/3-5, 5/3-6, and 5/3-15.8 of the School Code of Illinois.



Champion our Community

Champion our Community is a commitment from the Regional Office of Education #26 that we will be champions for each of our communities and our schools. That means taking pride in the many good things we have here, while working diligently to make things better. By getting involved and setting an example, we hope to encourage students to become champions for their communities as well. This is a great place to live, work and raise a family. To grow and prosper we need young people committed to our region and a great way to do that is to make sure they are surrounded by people who **Champion our Community**.

ROE26 State and Local Programs

Adult Education Program

ROE26 offers an Adult Education Program designed for the non-traditional students age 17 and above to achieve his/her High School Equivalency certificate and beyond. Through Individual Education Plans, our qualified staff are trained to assist students into the next level through connecting with local agencies and services, creating a transition plan for college, training or career readiness, and bridging the gap between student and services within the workforce area.

ROE26 is able to offer this program through a partnership with ROE 33 RAES (Regional Alternative Education Services). During a student's time in the program, he/she will learn basic skills for English Language Arts, Math, and workplace skills, as well as, become prepared to take the High School Equivalency Exam.

Child and Family Connections #13

Child and Family Connections (CFC) #13 is an early intervention program that serves infants and children ages 0-3 who have or are at risk of developmental delays. CFC assists families across nine Illinois counties with their children's adaptive, cognitive, communication, physical, and emotional needs.

Child and Family Connections #13 assists in identifying, planning, and providing services for children in need of our care. We provide in-home evaluations and therapy sessions, create personalized therapy sessions for you and your family, and monitor progress with 6 month check-ups. During the 2018-2019 year, CFC served 330 families in their nine county region.

Early Beginnings

Early Beginnings provides eligible families the information, support, and encouragement they need to help their children develop to their full potential prenatally to age 3 through home and center based programs. A variety of services are provided to families including comprehensive screenings, childbirth education, a book and media lending library, preschool transition plans, play to learn group programs, and the Parents as Teachers personal visit program. Parent Educators are certified using the *Parents as Teachers Program* model and Foundational Curriculum. Over 88 children, 74 families, and 14 prenatal families were served this year, and over 200 developmental screenings were conducted.



ROE Programs, continued.

Homeless Education

The Area 3 Lead Liaison Project provides professional development, technical assistance, information, and coordination of services for west central Illinois school districts regarding the rights and needs of homeless children and youth. A total of 442 homeless K-12 children were served, with another 33 preschool children served.

Preschool for All

The Preschool for All program is a high quality program that brings together qualified staff, a proven curriculum and parent involvement to help children aged 3-5 develop the skills they need to succeed in school and later in life. Preschool for All programs are offered in participating public and private schools, child care centers, community and faith-based organizations, Head Start and other settings. There is no cost to parents. During the 2018-2019 school year, 158 children were served in 3 child care centers and 2 school districts.

Project Stay In

The goal of the Truancy Intervention Program is to serve K-12 students by providing early assessment, intervention, and remediation of the factors related to Chronic Truancy and to focus on keeping students in school. In the state of Illinois, a Chronic Truant is any student subject to compulsory school attendance who is absent without valid cause 5% of the previous 180 school days. The goal of Project Stay In is to aid students and their families in re-establishing regular attendance, normal school habits, and academic success. In the 2018-2019 school year, our truancy caseworkers served 453 students from the four county region.

ROYALS—Regional Office Youth Alternative Learning Services

ROYALS offers alternative learning services to students in grades 6-12. ROYALS takes an individual approach to developing a meaningful relationship with each student to help each student progress toward his/her goals. The Safe School programs serve students who have been expelled or who have served multiple suspensions due to serious and/or repeated misconduct. Our Alternative programs are designed to serve students for a variety of purposes, including credit recovery and chronic truancy.

The mission of ROYALS is to guide students in achieving academic success and post-secondary success. ROYALS provides a safe environment in which high-quality education is delivered and high-quality learning takes place. Students understand that attending regularly, making quality academic progress and displaying positive behaviors are all part of school success. ROYALS staff serve as mentors in guiding students to make positive, meaningful choices that will impact their future in a favorable manner. This year, ROYALS served 146 students at three sites with 5 full time and 16 part time instructors. We are thrilled to share that 30 students completed coursework requirements to graduate and receive a diploma in their home school districts.

Early Beginnings earned its initial Blue-Ribbon Affiliate designation for the 2017-2018 school year. The endorsement is for top-performing early education partners in the Parents as Teachers network. Parents as Teachers is a nonprofit organization that designs and develops evidence-based curriculum, programs and training to promote development, learning and health in early childhood. To again be named again a Blue-Ribbon Affiliate affirms that Early Beginnings continues to serve as a high-quality early education provider within the home visitation and parent education field.




