KEYNOTE SPEAKER: TANEYA HIGGINBOTHAM

CEO/President of The RealiTea Project Inc.

The RealiTea ProjecT's mission is to discuss racial injustice and racial inequity, to stimulate actions and transform communities. Inspired by personal experience and knowing others have experienced obstacles similar to hers, Taneya decided it was time to take a stand. When asked about obstacles she has faced, Taneya says personally she has experienced microaggressions in the workplace and other pressure related to being a woman of color. 'The RealiTea Project' "is looking to stimulate positive conversation amongst community members relating to racism and racial injustice.

Adrienne Graham, Author & teacher: A Friendly Look at Diversity (The Color of Friendship)

Participants will understand the importance of teaching young children about diversity. They will also learn new ways to embrace and celebrate diversity with young children. The presentation would include information about my book, The Color of Friendship, why I wrote it, how I use it in the classroom and community, and how I've used it as a parent.

JQ Adams, ACE MIDWEST: <u>Reconnecting Through Humanity</u>

Participants will learn the 4 Pillars of human understanding. Participants will discuss the importance of dignity, respect, trust, and safety in human social interaction.

Sarah Schoper from One Human Family: <u>Talking About Race</u>: <u>What it is, Determining</u> <u>When it is Involved, and What to do When You</u> <u>Mess up</u>

Participants will learn how to define race and intersectionality, how to determine if something is about race, and what they can do if they mess up talking about race. During the presentation, participants will be asked to share their thoughts, participate in activities, and consider experiences they've had in relation to the content being shared. Resources for further learning will also be provided.

Michael Maher from Spoon River College: <u>Implicit Association Test (IAT)</u>

Dealing with the implicit association test (IAT). This test can be taken online, and it measure various implicit, unconscious biases.

HOMELESS EDUCATION PROGRAM The Area 3 Lead Liaison Program provides professional development and technical assistance to

The Area 3 Lead Liaison Program provides professional development and technical assistance to the school districts located in the west central Illinois counties that serve McKinney Vento eligible students and families.

McKinney-Vento

A federal law that ensures immediate enrollment and educational stability for homeless children and youth. Eligibility is defined by students/families who lack fixed, adequate or regular housing.

Fixed

A fixed residence is one that is stationary, permanent, and not subject to change.

Adequate

An adequate residence is one that is sufficient for meeting both the physical and psychological needs typically met in home environments.

Regular

A regular residence is one that is used on a regular (i.e. nightly) basis.

Eligible Children/Youth have the right to

- Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately.
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Attend the local school; or continue at the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled.
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.
